8. TRANSPORT AND POSTS

Transport modes

There are three modes of transport: sea, air and land. This sector includes also mail and parcels movement.

Sea transport

6 ports provide CAS with figures: Beirut, Tripoli, Tyr, Saida, Jieh and Zahrani, and Jounieh.




Air transport


The Rafic Hariri International Airport connects Lebanon to 194 world airports. 39,060 aircrafts landed and took-off from this airport with a peak registered in August (9.7%). Total passengers and transit passengers was 3,409,014 with a peak registered in August (12.4%). Total unloaded and loaded cargo and mail was 65,020,536 tons with a peak in September (10.0%).





Road transport

Road transport consists of private cars, motorcycles, taxis, public and private collective transport.

Recorded vehicle stocking

70,659 vehicles were registered in 2007 of which 66.9% are private cars and 17.2% are motorcycles. The peak of vehicles was registered in August (10.5%). As for red number (hiring cars or taxis), it was 53,736 and taxis were the peak (62.3%). The number of taxi drivers registered at the Syndicate of Taxi Drivers in Beirut was 31,825.

Public collective transport

The Ministry of Transport, Office of Railways & Collective Transport provides CAS with statistics related to 3 lanes. The number of buses decreased in the three lanes since the beginning of 2007. The decrease was at its peak in Beirut and its suburb. In fact, its number of buses decreased by 26.1%, the number of trips 33.1%, the sum of covered Km by 23.2%, the total revenues in million LBP by 29.6% and the approximate number of passengers by 29.6%.

As for the three lanes, the number of buses decreased by 26.9%, the total number of trips by 34.2%, the sum of covered Km by 25.6%, the total revenues in million LBP by 31.4% and the approximate number of passengers by 31.0%.

Private collective transport

The Lebanese Commuting Company (LCC) provides CAS with statistics related to 15 lanes. Lane 1 transports people between Hamra and Khaldeh, lane 2 between Hamra and Antelias, lane 4 between Military Swimming pool and Hay El Seloum, lane 5 between Ain Mreisseh and Hay El Seloum, lane 6 between Cola and Jbeil, lane 7 between Museum and Bhersaf, lane 8 between Military swimming pool and Ain Saadeh, lane 9 between Barbri and Nahr el Mott, lane 12 between Hamra and Bourj Barajneh, lane 15 between Cola and Musuem and Aley-Qmatiyeh. The figures show that LCC is downsizing because 2004 figures were the highest and 2007 figures were the lowest. The decrease in number of buses was -21.2%, in sum of covered kilometres was -53.0% and in number of employees -19.8% between 2004 and 2007. The cause may be the fierce competition in this sector.




